

Willie Mae Broussard Ingwersen, 88, died on Monday, February 6, 2017, at Seton Medical Center Williamson, in Round Rock, Texas.

Willie was born in Vinton, Louisiana. She and eight other siblings lived on a share cropper's farm. Her parents, John Portalise Broussard of Abbeville La. and Cleoma Simon Broussard of Scott, Louisiana, provided as best they could. Their life was one of struggle and hunger and included her mother dying when Willie was a child.

Willie Mae moved to Nederland at the age of 8 and lived with her sister and

brother-in-law, Viola Broussard Maxwell and U. A. Maxwell. In 1951, she married the love of her life, Wayne M Ingwersen, Sr. of Nederland. For a short time they moved to Augusta, Georgia, but soon moved back to be near family. They were married for forty-two years and had six children. Her oldest son, Marcus Wayne was still born.

Willie loved doing anything that included her husband Wayne, and all of her children and grandchildren, including water skiing, camping and cross country motorcycle rides. She loved gardening and was always so proud of her bluebonnets, day lilies and roses. Untold numbers of children, grandchildren and friends' children, took their photo in her bluebonnet field. Willie worked a variety of jobs when she was young, including the lunch counter at Baker Williford, the popcorn girl at the theatre in Beaumont and her favorite job, shoe sales at Bakers in Beaumont. Willie also worked as a sales person at Caldwells Fabric in Nederland for many years while her children were growing up. Because of this she would get a cut rate on bolts of fabric which, much to their chagrin resulted in her whole family being dressed in the same fabric.


Willie Mae was a second mother to her grandchildren and many of her children's friends, along with her nieces and nephews. She had an open door for all. Willie Mae would give you the shirt off her back if she thought you needed it and everyone was welcome at the Ingwersen home. If you did go by, you were sure to be offered some of her homemade pancakes. Her 'Mo' cakes were legendary and no matter how hard you would try, you could never duplicate her recipe.



















