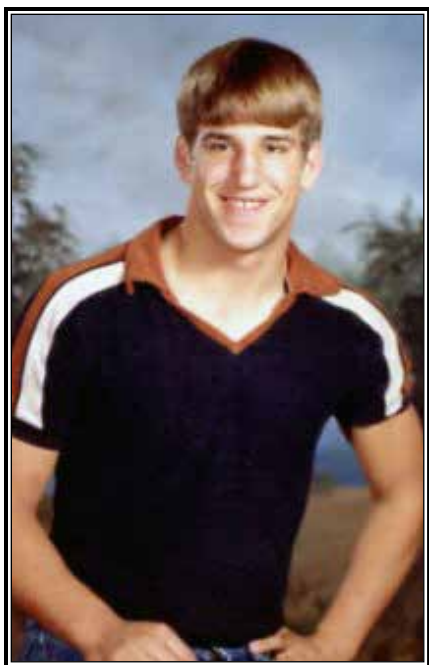




Chris Karaff

October 7, 1963 - May 23, 2018

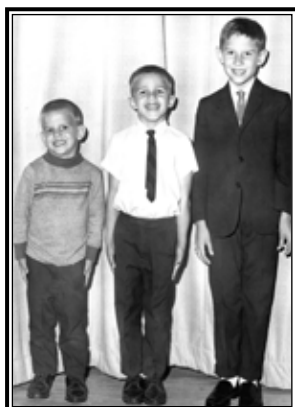
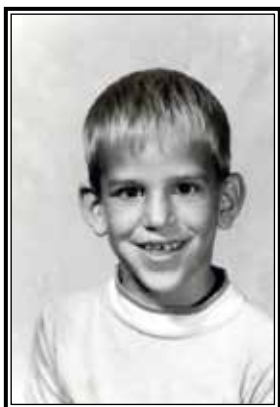


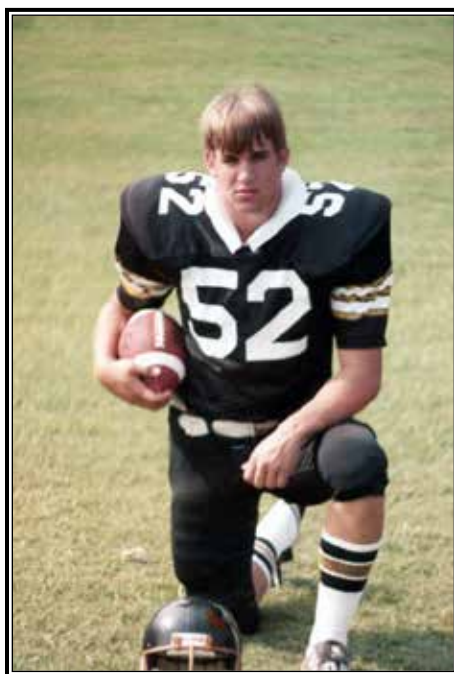
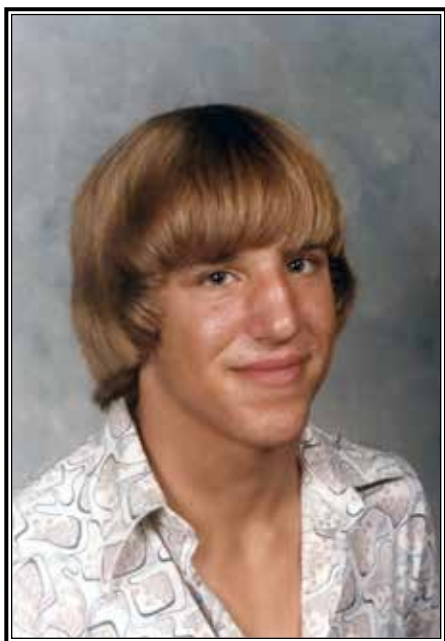
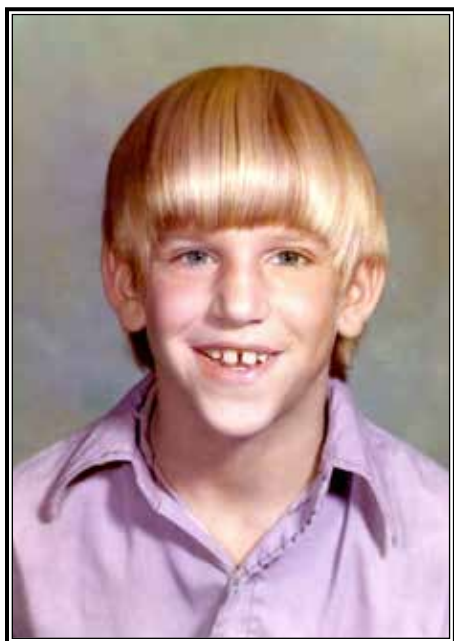
