him here to the Southeast Texas community, where he owned and operated Morris Moore Chevrolet, home of the #1 Moore Better Deal, for 50 years. Morris was the life of the party, he loved dancing and he loved spending time with his friends and family, his people. If he was laughing, you were, too. If he smiled at you, you smiled back. That's the epitome of who he was: a bright light everyone loved to be around.

A true force to be reckoned with, he never took no for an answer, he always believed in "better" and he showed us how important it is to do what you love, no matter what. His strength, resilience and his determined, generous spirit impacted the lives of so many people over the years, and his legacy is one as extraordinary as he was. He is preceded in death by his sons, Jimmy Moore and Danny Moore, and his great-grandson, Chandler Duvail.
