Dorothy Pauline "Dot" Robbins, 86, of Port Neches, died Thursday, February 4, 2021. She was born May 1, 1934, in Port Arthur, to Gladys Theresa Hebert Judice and Waysie Joseph Judice.

Dot's life was nothing short of amazing. There is a saying that people can either lead a life of success or a life of significance and we would say that her life has been successfully significant. On the day of her passing to be with God, she had received many phone calls from numerous loved ones. Although she was non-responsive, you can bet she knew who each and every caller was, and she was comforted by them all. Each person spoke to her through speaker phone as it was placed by her ear to make sure she could hear them. The recurring theme seemed to be that she had taught them about the importance of family and how she had changed their lives. As one of her nieces reminisced, "She raised us all and taught us everything we need to know in order to be good people." We all knew her "goodness, kindness, and funniness."

Dot was "Mom" to seven children and their spouses. She enjoyed spending time with her sisters. They were her best friends. With two of her sisters being several years younger, she often treated them and their spouses like her own children. She even gave their children their first baths and babysat frequently. Many others called her "Granny" even though they were not actually her grandchildren. She welcomed the gesture by attending their weddings; showers; plays; dance performances; etc. Dot always made everyone she met feel special and as if they were truly a part of her family. As one of her granddaughters remembered, "Everyone loved Granny. She did everything she could to make it to games; school programs; talent shows; and award ceremonies."

Many of her grandchildren have reminisced of some other well-known

facts about their Granny: the expired food in the refrigerator that had to be eaten; her bad driving; her fabulous macaroni and cheese; too much sugar in the tea; and always running late, though she always showed up! Dot apparently believed that it was okay to be late to church as long as she heard the words, “The Mass has ended, you may go in peace.” Her rosary was an extension of her hand. She believed strongly in the importance of family and none of her children could miss a family event or she would give them a call. If anyone had an illness or surgery, she was there to take care of them; feed them; clean their homes; and run their errands.

Dot enjoyed having visitors and nobody left her home without being offered something to eat. You were served on a paper plate. None of the silverware or glasses matched. She simply didn't feel that it was important. To her, it was about spending time with family. Dot also loved movies and was quick on the draw with the remote. If she thought you were about to leave, she would start a movie. She was frugal and could make a ten-dollar dress look like it was worth a million. She absolutely loved Christmas and every child, grandchild, and great-grandchild received a gift. On a very limited budget, she would purchase approximately ninety gifts each year. This past year was no exception. Even as sick as she was, Dot still went shopping and her gifts filled the room. This was an amazing testament of her wanting everyone to know that she loved them.

Dot Robbins was a mother; sister; aunt; grandmother; great-grandmother; and a friend to many, but most of all, she was successfully significant to us all and her loving impact will be with us forever and always.


